Souvenir Cards States P-W

A compilation of numismatic souvenir cards issued by various associations, societies, and clubs within the United States. Other North American countries are excluded from this list and will eventually be included in a list of numismatic cards issued by foreign numismatic groups.

The list is organized by the state in which they were issued, followed by the issuing organization, then the date. Organizations with a nationwide presence appear at the beginning of the list. This helps to keep cards issued by a specific organization together. Numismatic organizations that are still issuing souvenir cards and those that are most likely to have additions appear at the end of each state grouping. This is intended to reduce the number of changes to the numbering system, but all numbers are subject to extensive changes.

Smaller lists with images are broken down into alphabetical groupings by state. This will allow for greater ease in updating the lists and reduce the file sizes for uploading and downloading. The list will be periodically updated.

If you can provide scans of additional numismatic cards not listed, please e-mail Don Epp at djge61@msn.com or Greg Alexander at sccs1981@yahoo.com. Scans must be in color and scanned at 300 dpi. The dimensions of the cards must also be provided.

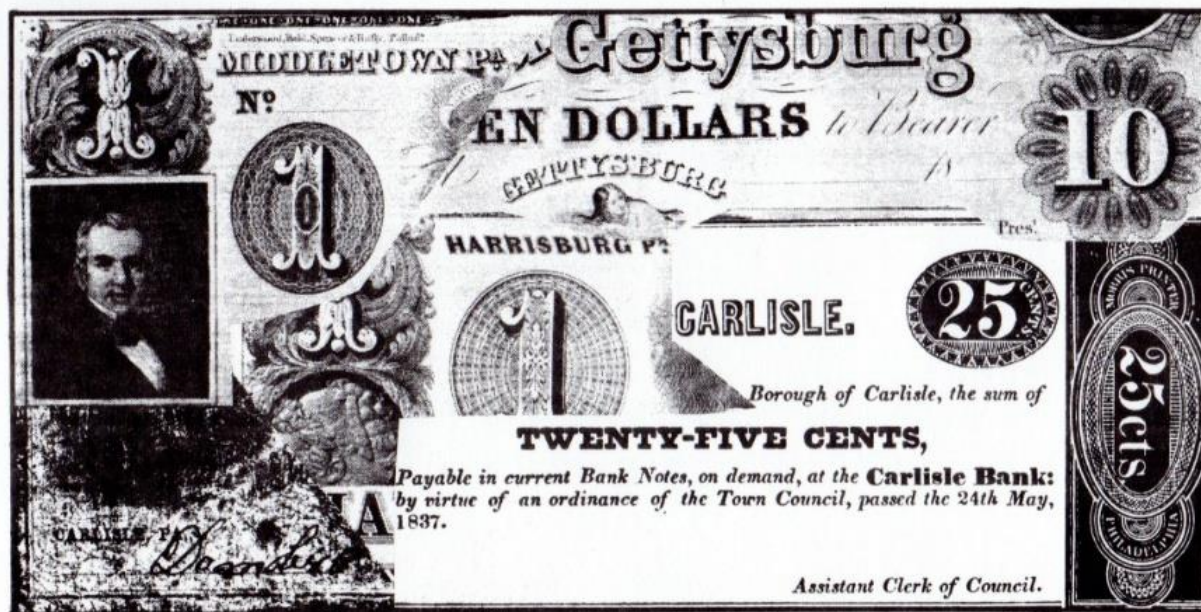

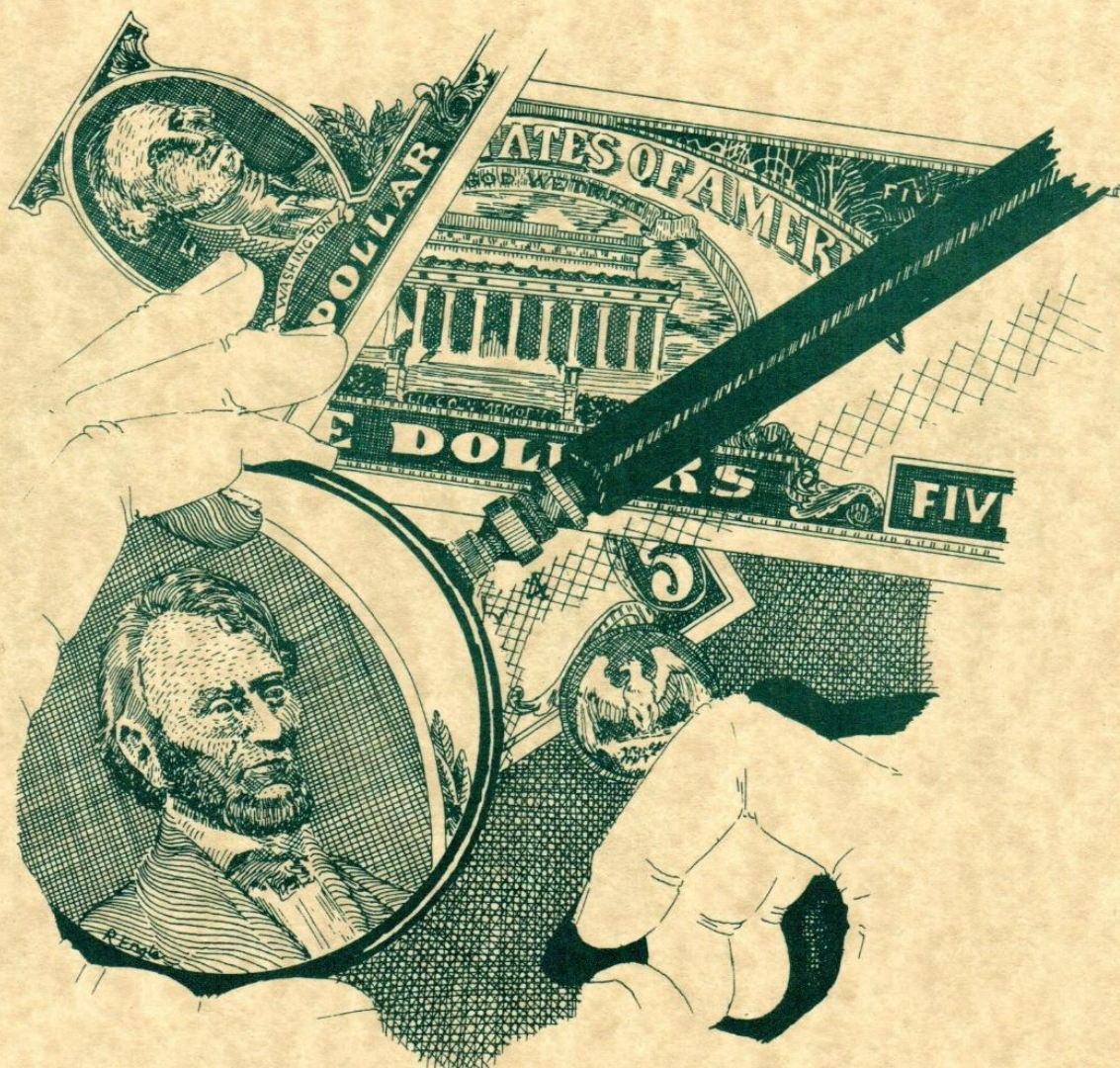

It pays tribute to the early banking industry of South Central Pennsylvania, and features banknotes from that area in the above collage presentation. A Sutler note and fractional note from Carlisle, national and broken bank notes from Middletown, Gettysburg and Harrisburg have been used in our vignette. The Sutler note of course was from the Civil War Era. Broken bank notes were from the 1830-1850 period. National banknotes began appearing toward the end of the nineteenth century.





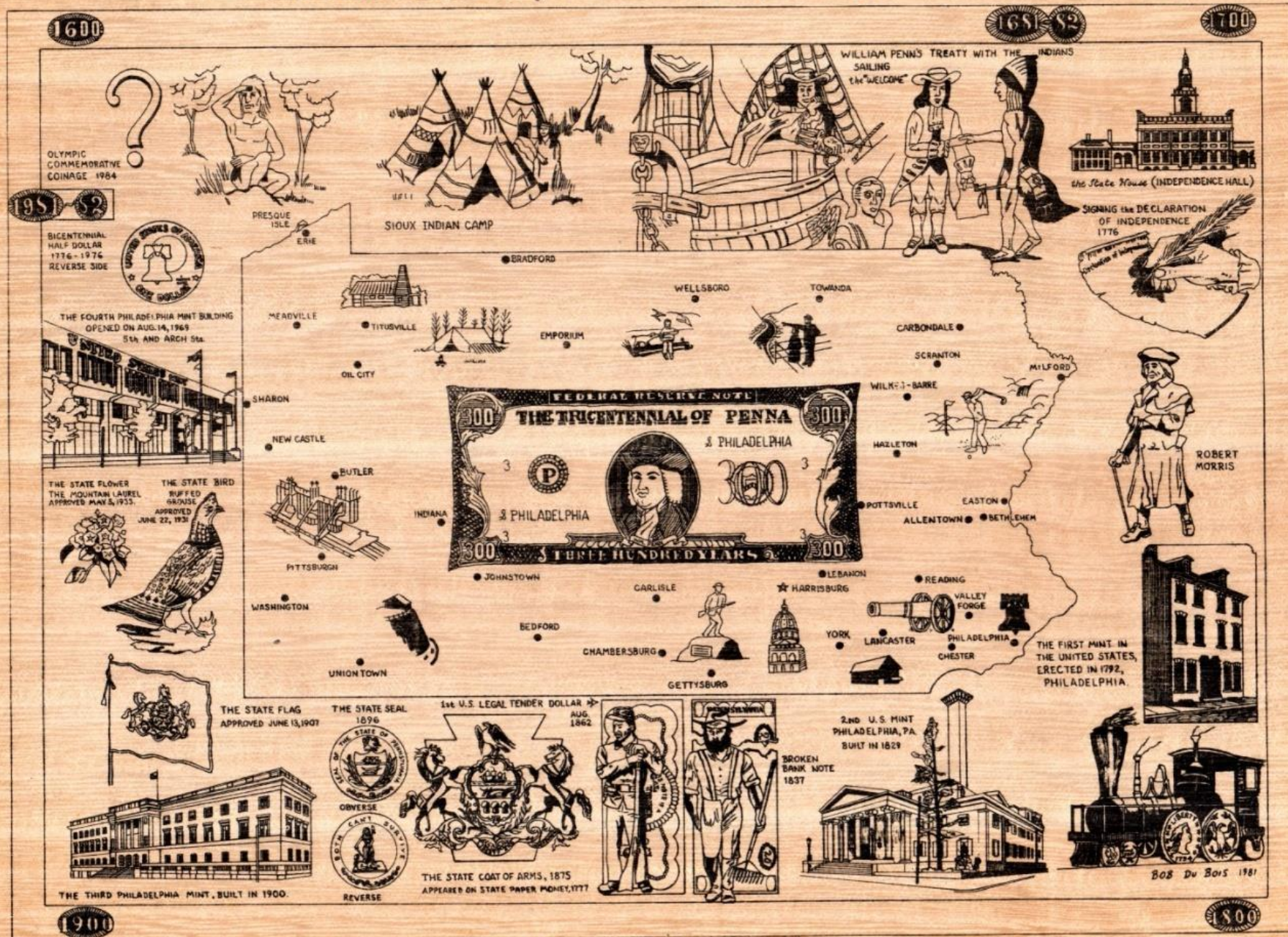

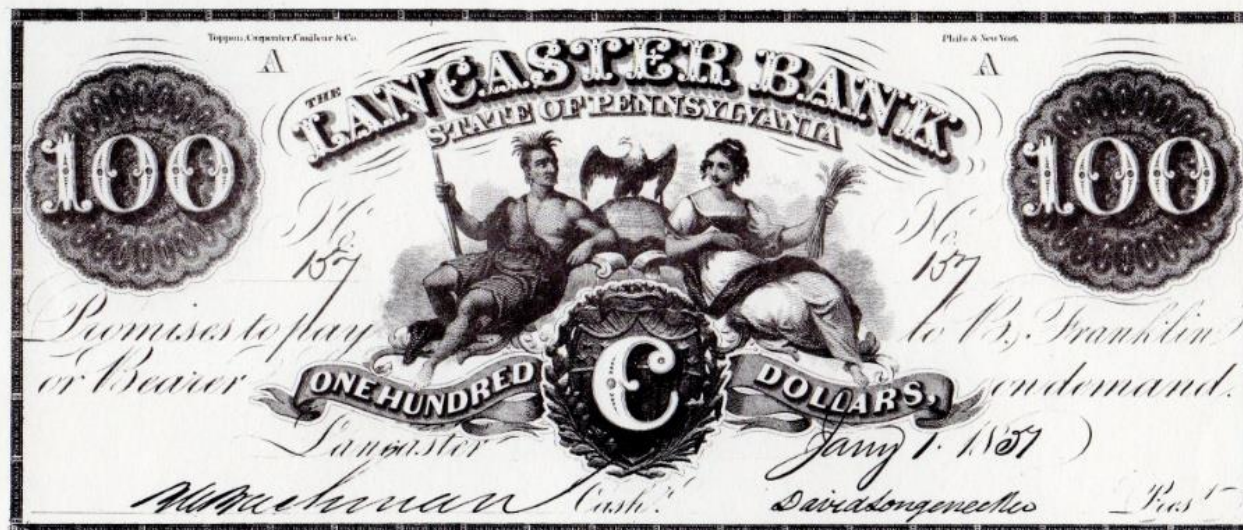
With this banknote reproduction, the Red Rose Coin Club again pays tribute to the historic past of the Lancaster community. The Lancaster Bank, formerly named the Lancaster Trading Company, was incorporated March 24, 1818, and issued banknotes in eight denominations. This \$100 note is very rare. The central figures on this note are an eagle, Ceres - Roman Goddess of Agriculture and an Indian Maiden of the Conestoga Tribe. The Lancaster Bank closed in 1856.

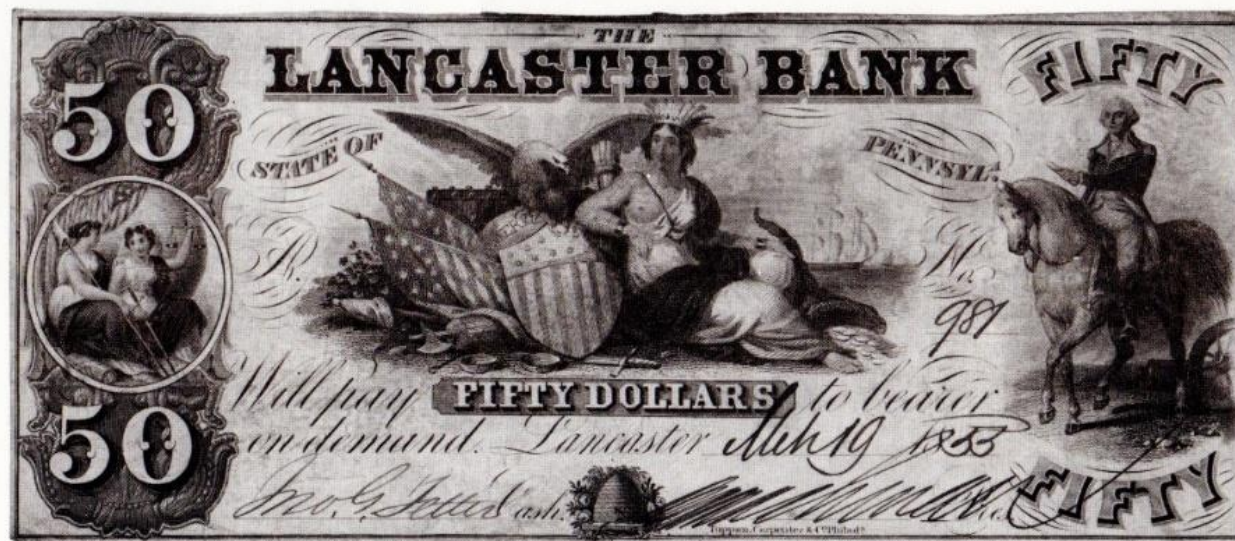
The Lancaster Bank, in operation from 1818 to 1856, issued banknotes in eight denominations. This \$100 note is rare. The central figures are an eagle, an Indian as pictured by early artists, and a maiden holding wheat, representing Ceres, Roman goddess of agriculture. The note, dated January 1, 1851, is payable "to B. Franklin or Bearer." Use of such a famous name - actually having no connection with the bank - was one way of suggesting the institution had strength and stability. The note is signed by David Longenecker, President, and B. C. Bachman, Cashier.

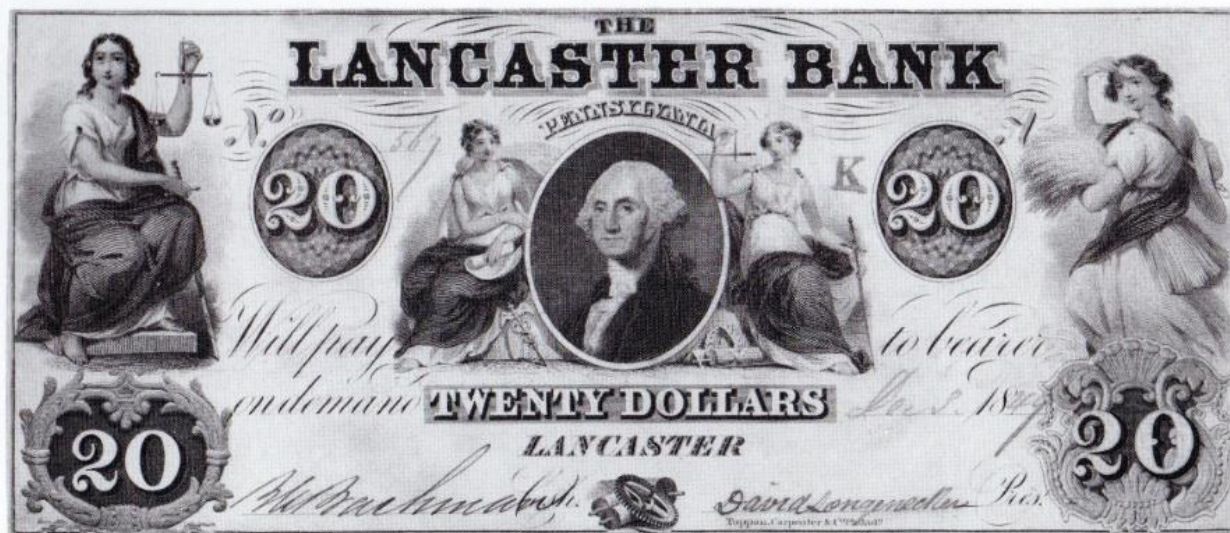
The historic banking past of the Lancaster community once again receives tribute from the Red Rose Coin Club. The Lancaster Bank, formerly known as the Lancaster Trading Company was incorporated March 24, 1818. The \$50.00 note shows an Indian maiden, eagle, shield and flags in the center. At the right and left respectively, we have George Washington on horseback, and Liberty and Justice symbolized in cameo.

At the far end left is Justice, with Agriculture symbolized at the far right.

The Red Rose Coin Club again wishes to remember its historic banking past. The Lancaster Bank, formerly known as the Lancaster Trading Company, was incorporated March 24, 1818 and existed until 1856. The \$10.00 note shows a magnificent spread eagle on a shield with commercial buildings in the background. On the right is an allegorical representation of Liberty with 10 above and "TEN" below. On the left is a portrait of a young woman, unknown, 10 above and below. Toppan, Carpenter & Co. of Philadelphia were the engravers.

The annual salute to commercial banking in Lancaster's historic past is again observed by the Red Rose Coin Club. Formerly known as the Lancaster Trading Company, the Lancaster Bank was incorporated March 24, 1818. The \$5.00 note shown is the last design used, from among several of this denomination. The central vignette is an interesting agricultural scene, but with a train in the background. The mother in cameo and the child are unknown. The printer was again Toppan, Carpenter & Co. of Philadelphia and New York City.

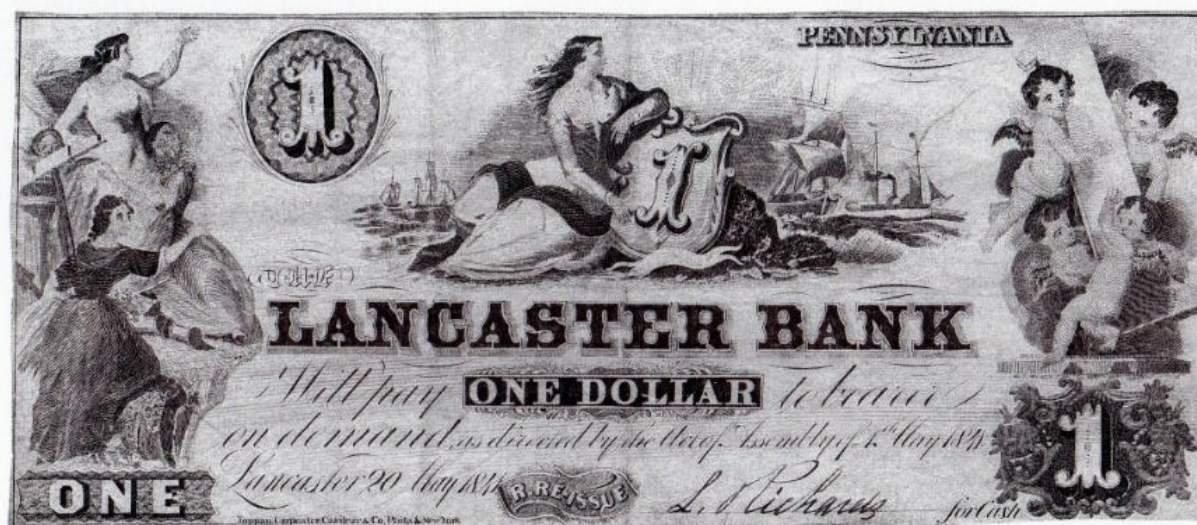
The Red Rose Coin Club pays its traditional tribute to the historic banking past of the Lancaster community. First known as the Lancaster Trading Company, the Lancaster Bank was incorporated March 24, 1818. Among the denominations issued, was the \$2.00 re-issue note (as shown above). The central theme shows a woman holding child, with reapers in a farm scene to the right. The end panels, somewhat tapestry-like, show cameos of Bacchus, with large numerals above and below. The Lancaster Bank closed its doors in 1856.

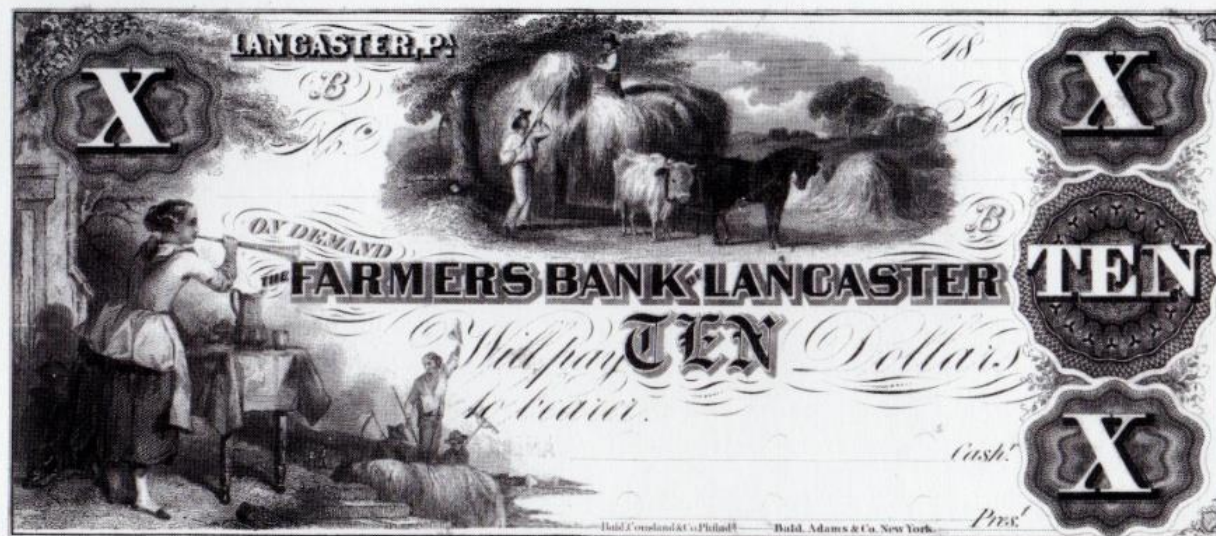
The Red Rose Coin Club again pays tribute to the historical past of the banking industry. The \$1.00 denomination shown above suffered from heavy circulation, thus specimens are generally heavily worn. The design is dominated by a nautical theme with four differently designed ships, the one at the far right somewhat reminiscent of Robert Fulton's Clermont. Four winged cherubs at the right lend a light-hearted theme to the note. The Lancaster Bank, originally known as the Lancaster Trading Company, incorporated in 1818 and closed in 1856.

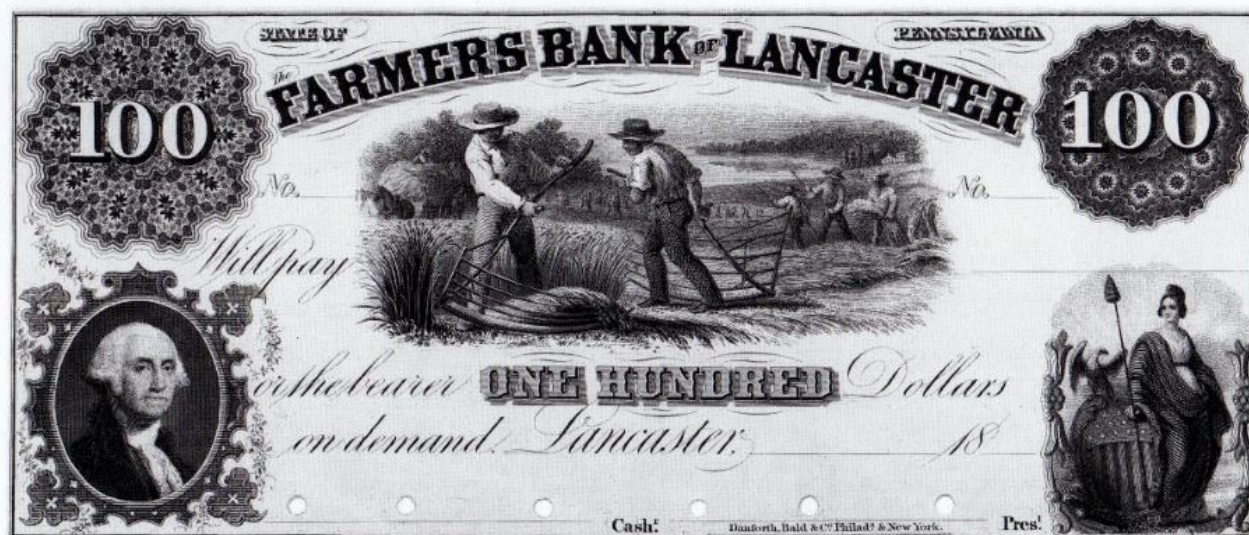
In our tribute to the banking history of Lancaster, we have chosen a specimen note of ten dollar denomination. This was an issue of the Farmers Bank of Lancaster, a specimen note by virtue of its lack of signatures, date, etc. In the design, the Roman numeral "X" for ten appears three times, somewhat reminiscent of the "Dix" notes of New Orleans. Engraving and printing were done by Bald, Adams & Co., New York and its Philadelphia associate, Bald, Cousland & Co.

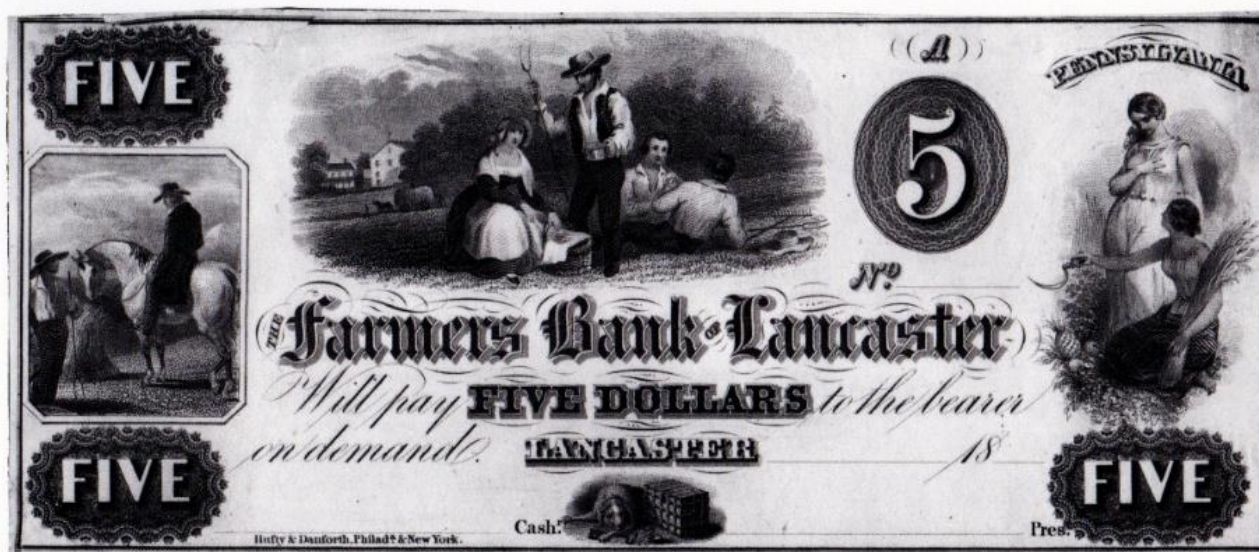
The Red Rose Coin Club has chosen the above banknote of the one hundred dollar denomination, as our annual tribute to the early banking history of Lancaster. An issue of the Farmers Bank of Lancaster, by virtue of its lack of date and signatures, it is a specimen note. Most prominent is an appropriate agricultural scene with workers in the grain field, flanked below by a portrait of George Washington on the left, and a patriotic allegorical figure on the right. Engraving and printing were done by Danforth, Bald & Co. of Philadelphia and New York.

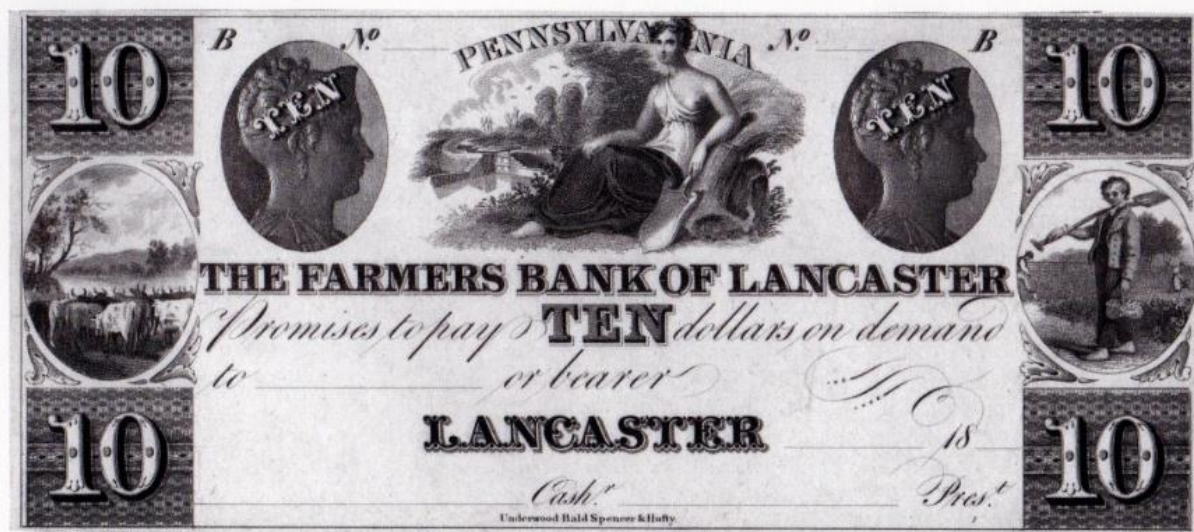
Annual tribute to the mercantile banking business of Lancaster is again presented by The Red Rose Coin Club. Three interesting vignettes are displayed in the body of the note, all agricultural in nature. At the extreme left, we see two farmers in conversation, perhaps the one on the horse is a landowner. In the center is an idyllic farmland scene with the farmer and his pitchfork highlighted. At right are two maidens, one with scythe and sheaf of grain. The note, unsigned, is a specimen note used in the pre-civil war period, printed by Hufty & Danforth of Philadelphia and New York.

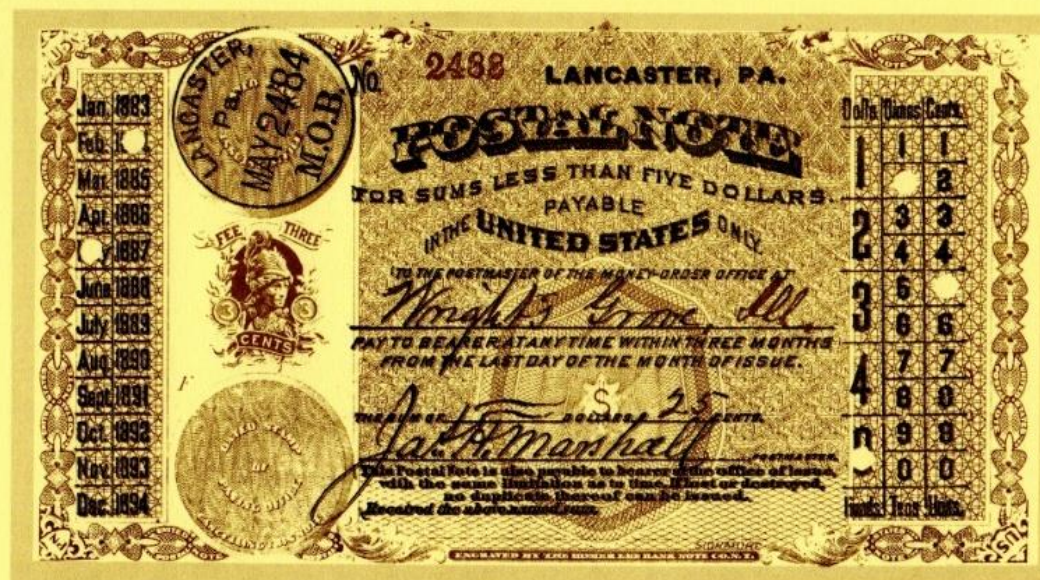
The latest issue of souvenir card annualized by the Red Rose Coin Club is another specimen note from the Farmers Bank of Lancaster. Unsigned, this general issue was in use roughly from 1835 - 1850. Regarding its design, one might think it a bit of hodge-podge. From the vignette with cattle at left to the youngish dapper farmer at right, and the seated maiden in a garden setting, they contrast with the classic encircled busts with the denomination on the forehead. The note was printed by Underwood, Bald, Spencer and Hufty, and is an interesting contrast to the ten dollar "Dix" note used on the 1991 issue.

This year, Red Rose Coin Club is making a departure from its traditional design of its souvenir card. As an example of postal banking, the postal note shown, issued in Lancaster, Pa. is dated May 24, 1884 and represents a value of twenty-five cents. It was sent to Wright's Grove, Ill. for a three cent fee. The note was engraved by the Homer Lee Banknote Co. of New York, and is signed by Postmaster Joseph H. Marshall of Lancaster. Although not shown, the reverse is "busy" with fancy design and legends, some of which include "hex-like" patterns similar to those of our area.

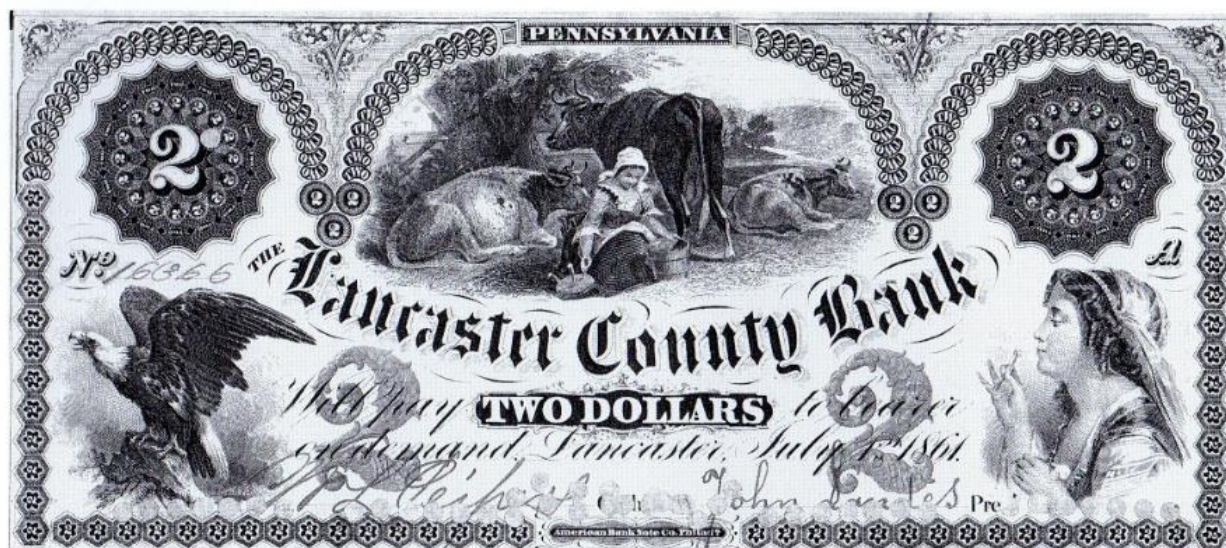
With this year's issue, the Red Rose Coin Club begins a series of seven rare notes issued by the Lancaster County Bank. The bank was organized in 1841 by a group of thrifty farmers, merchants and professional men with \$300,000 subscribed to form the capital stock. Twelve German landowners were selected for its first board. The American Bank Note Company of Philadelphia printed the \$1 and \$2 notes. This \$1 note shows Gen. George Washington and two officers on the right. A woman reaper takes a moment to rest in the left vignette. Signatures are of W. L. Peiper, cashier, and John Landes the bank's president.

1997



The Lancaster County Bank began with an iron asbestos safe in 1841. Operating on conservative and constructive lines, it prospered. In 1842 it required all borrowers to reduce their obligations 10% at renewal. Such sound banking allowed it to declare its first dividend of 5% in October of 1842. The bank purchased larger facilities in 1843 and by 1845 was able to issue \$20,000 in \$5 notes. This \$2 note is dominated by a central vignette of a milkmaid and cows in a pasture. On the left is our country's symbol, the bald eagle; to the right is a young lady with flowers. Second in a series of seven notes.

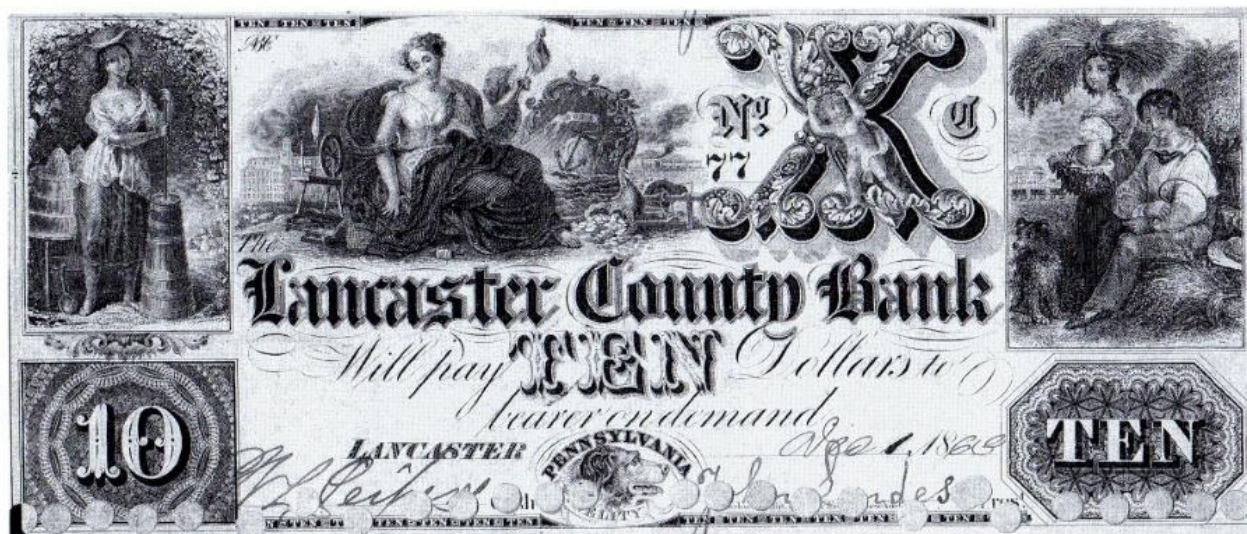
The Lancaster County Bank in its early years assisted in establishing local industries and volunteer fire companies. Christian Herr of Manor Twp., a prominent bank officer, was instrumental in the founding of Millersville State Normal School. In 1885 the bank purchased a property in the first block of East King Street, its headquarters for many years. Before the panic of 1857, the bank required all borrowers to reduce their loans by 20% at each renewal. Records show frequent shipments of gold specie to Philadelphia. The bank was the only local institution to maintain its circulation at par. Reapers are at work on the left, while those on the right are served a noontime repast. Note cherubs in the ornate 5. Engravers for the \$5 through \$100 notes were Rawdon, Wright, Hatch & Edson of New York. Third in a series of seven notes.

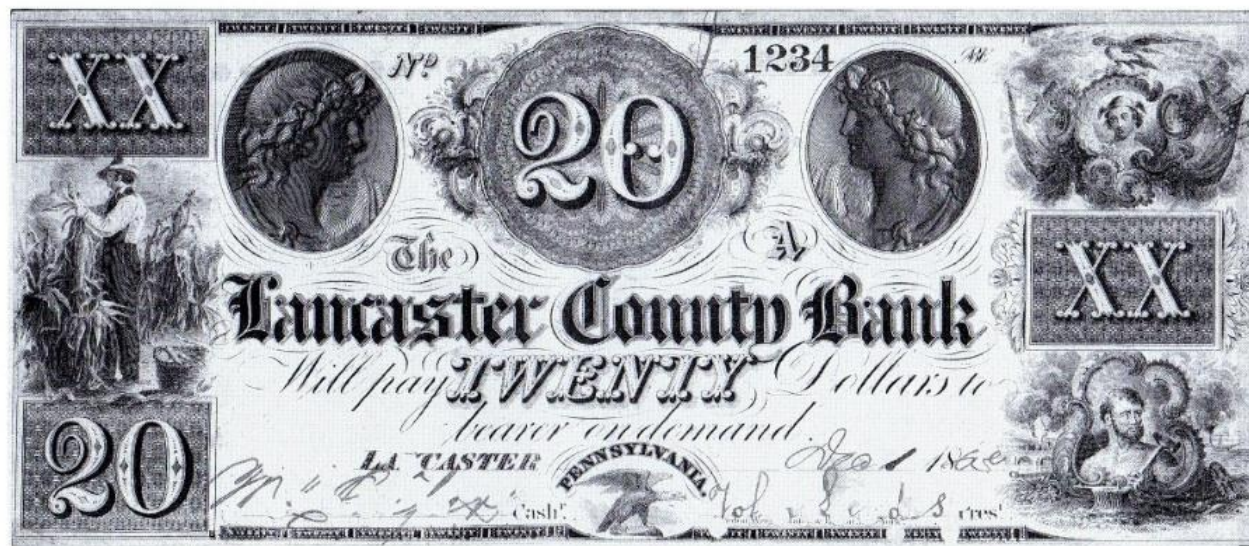
The Lancaster County Bank was subjected to the same hazards and uncertainties as all other banks during the Civil War. Minutes of the bank authorized the immediate shipment to Philadelphia of all gold and silver coin for safekeeping. The board even authorized the immediate destruction of its circulating notes, amounting to \$269,000 with an additional \$151,000 of its notes burned by the bank on the eve of the battle at Gettysburg. This \$10 note with the ornamental "X" containing a cherub shows vignettes of a milkmaid on the left, reapers on the right and in the center Commerce before her spinning wheel, a huge factory, an anchor of Hope, a steam locomotive and a cornucopia overflowing with coins. Fourth in a series of seven notes.

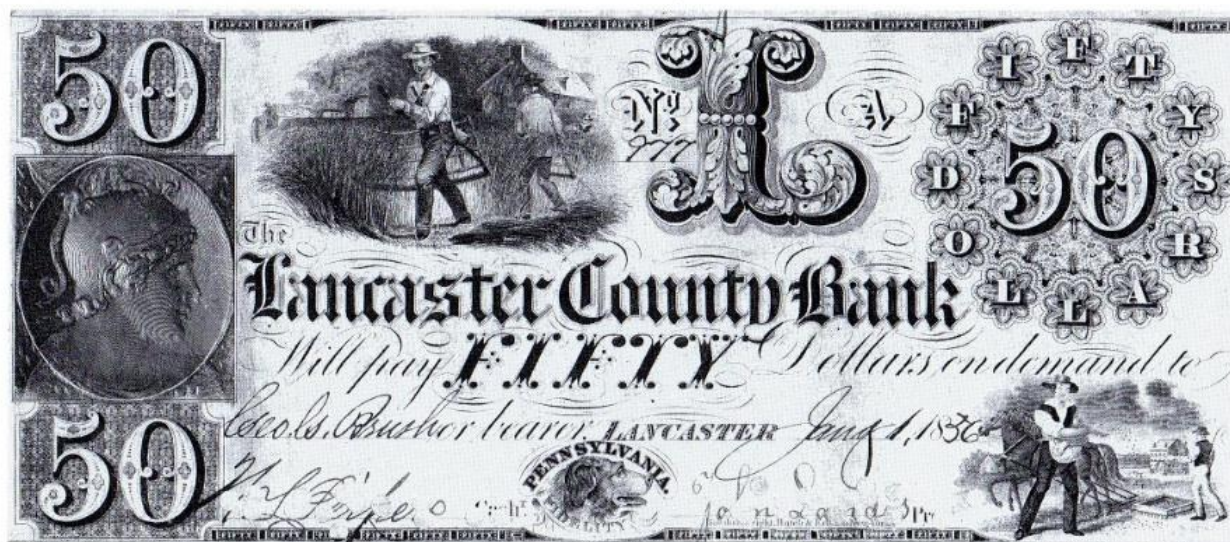
The Lancaster County Bank was fortunate in having chosen reliable leaders to serve its customers. John Landes was president from 1841 to 1867 and Christian B. Herr from 1867 to 1890. Growth continued at a steady but determined pace with the installation of a safe deposit vault, burglar alarm system and interest-bearing certificates of deposit. In 1914 the Lancaster County Bank became a member of the Federal Reserve System and showed its patriotism during World War I by helping place among its customers the several large Liberty Loan issues. The \$20 note is the first in the series to feature medallion heads. To the left is a reaper and on the right allegorical Commerce and Industry. Fifth in a series of seven notes.

This series of seven notes issued by the American Bank Note Co. of Phila. for The Lancaster County Bank is comparatively rare, considering other notes of the same period for Lancaster City. Until this set was uncovered, there were no surviving examples to confirm written descriptions of several denominations. All of the notes are signed by W. L. Peiper, cashier, and John Landes, president. The years between the World Wars saw the bank open a trust department, Christmas and vacation clubs and insure its depositors' funds through the FDIC. This \$50 note with medallion head and reapers features an exquisite design incorporating arabic numerals and the words FIFTY DOLLARS plus an elaborate Roman "L" for fifty. Sixth in a series of seven notes.

With this \$100 note the Red Rose Coin Club concludes its series of seven bank notes by The Lancaster County Bank which issued notes between the years of 1841 and 1865. It's a fine set of historical prints of one of Lancaster's most reliable commercial institutions. The bank became The Lancaster County National Bank and, as with many solid small-town banks, it eventually lost its local identity through mergers. The \$100 note repeats a portion of the allegorical Commerce on the \$10 note. A farmer plows in the lower right. An elaborate central vignette shows a team of oxen pulling a mammoth load of wheat, farm boys on top, a farmer astride his horse and his ubiquitous farm dog. A magnifying glass reveals a mill, a mill wheel, a bridge, a plow and a watermelon patch. \$500 notes are reported issued but are unconfirmed.

The Farmers National Bank of Lancaster, Pennsylvania received its charter (no. 597) on December 1st, 1864. It issued "Original Series" notes (such as the example on this card), Series 1875 notes, and Series 1882 "Brown Back" notes. It was the second National bank located in Lancaster City, but the oldest state bank, having received its state charter in 1810. It was located at the southwest corner of E. King and S. Duke streets. The national bank was liquidated on November 22nd, 1904 and reorganized as the Farmers Trust Company of Lancaster. This card is no. 1 in a series of seven.

The Fulton National Bank of Lancaster, Pennsylvania received its charter (no. 2634) on February 21st, 1882. It issued Series 1875 notes (such as the example on this card), Series 1882 "Brown Back" notes, 1882 "Date Back" notes, 1882 "Value Back" notes, 1902 "Plain Back" notes, and 1929 Series Type 1 & 2 notes. It had its first permanent building at 11-13 North Queen Street, and it was named in honor of Lancaster County native, Robert Fulton, the inventor and artist. Seven members of the bank's first board were connected to the tobacco business, which figured prominently in the late 19th century Lancaster economy. This card is no. 2 in a series of seven.

This private souvenir card is being issued by the Milwaukee Numismatic Society to commemorate their 63rd Anniversary Coin Convention. The souvenir card is limited to 75 numbered copies. The above \$5 and \$10 remainder notes from the Milwaukee County Bank (Wisconsin) are reproduced on this souvenir card to commemorate the above mentioned event. Formerly, the Banking House of Armstrong, Spink & Co., the Milwaukee County Bank, opened in 1862 with a Capital of \$50,000. The President was John Armstrong, and the Cashier was J. L. Spink. In 1865, the Cashier was Louis Scheffer. The bank closed sometime in 1865. These beautiful green tinted notes, with Red No. 6699, were produced by the American Bank Note Company in New York. They are dated September 1, 1862 and show that the bank had a Capital of \$100,000. The above note has on left a female leaning on a bale of hay and at center the head of a young female. Three (\$5 & \$10) sheets and two single \$5 and \$10 notes are known, along with a unique 25 Cent denomination.
